

User Guide for A+ Education

Provides bibliographic and full text information from more than 130 Australian and New Zealand publications indexed in Australian Education Index (AEI), the database contains journal contents since 1978, offering full text articles from 2000 onwards. It covers all aspects of education such as curriculum, educational research, teaching and training. Source documents include scholarly journals, books, conferences, reports and occasional papers from the region.

1. Basic Search

Using robotic toys in early childhood education to support children's social and emotional competencies

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Abstract
This Australian study examines whether and how technologies such as Artificially Intelligent (AI) robotic toys in a home-based setting might socially and emotionally support children with diverse needs through play. Building on the concept of 'emotional capital', and employing a design-based approach, parents during the COVID-19 lockdown periods in 2020 intentionally used AI robotic toys to engage their children with additional diverse needs in home-based learning environments. Data from both parents' and children's (n = 5) Zoom interview transcripts and drawings demonstrated how children creatively constructed and used AI robotic toys during the coding experiences. The study highlights the importance of AI robotic toys together with parents' emotional capital in supporting children's social and emotional competencies.

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

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5. Export Citations

Select records for export in the result page
